Women, who completed the task daily, did not feel like they were experts, but men who simply just observed the task felt confident enough to say they were experts. Nicole told us, "And that's the difference."

- In the past five years, Iowa has lost over 37% of child-care providers. This means there are over 360,000 children without affordable child care, significantly impacting women's ability to work and be successful.

To combat these statistics, the IWF has awarded over 1 million in grants to over 200 organizations throughout the state geared at fixing the disparity between men and women's success levels in Iowa. The IWF also works to educate policymakers and key leaders in the community on steps of action. **The IWF is the only state-wide organization aimed at enhancing and improving the lives of women's economic self-sufficiency**.
