She worked several jobs and changed college careers over the years, only to have a mentor finally guide her down the business path. Her advice rang strong and clear get a mentor early!! As an established businesswoman and now CIO of such a predominant organization, she supports a \$68 million budget with over 2,000 other employees throughout the company. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation "envisions a world where every person has the **opportunity to live a healthy, productive life.**" The campus for their company's headquarters opened in Seattle in 2011. This campus stands as a hub for innovation and a place for experts from all over the world to gather (before COVID) to implement new ideas to improve lives world vide.

The Foundation operates through grantees and partnership that helps finance new scientific and technological breakthroughs. Their work is also supported by the government, the private sector, communities, nonprofits, and individuals. Sue Taylor loves working for an organization that allows her to lead with her heart and directly impact and improve lives worldwide. As CIO of the Foundation, she has significantly transformed her team over the last four years. Her initiatives have increased diversity at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation by 25%! Q: What skills do you believe are the most valuable to work on at this time?

A: I have found time management to be the most valuable skill while working during this time. Working from home makes it difficult to find the work / life balance as you are always at work. It is easy to get distracted during the day with your phone, TV, or walking to get coffee. It is important to be able to focus on work during working hours so that you are able to "go home" after work and take a break.

Q: Why do you feel mentorship is valuable & if you are willing, please share a bit about your experience in WIB's mentorship program.

A: I think Mentorship is valuable because it provides someone to learn from, someone to discuss hard topics with, and someone to fight for you. The year or two after college are a huge transition and having someone to bounce ideas off of and who has been in your position before makes it much easier. A lot of workplaces have formal mentorship programs but it's important to have a mentor you can speak freely with and who wants the best for you so it's okay to have more than one! They can help you with work transitions, promotions, and getting what you want / need in a job.

Q: What advice would you give women at the University of Iowa right now who are looking to develop themselves professionally during this time?

A: My advice would be to develop strong communication skills. **During this time, communication skills are key because you are not always sitting next to the people you are working with.** It is important to know how to communicate clearly and efficiently whether it's verbal or written. Being a good team-member requires being able to communicate your ideas as well as communicate things you are may need some help with or times when you may need to talk to someone about what is on your plate and how to get it completed or if things need to be spread throughout the team.
